>Diana Garza, 1011 10th Street, Mercedes, Texas

Mrs. Garza addressed the following concerns:

"First of all, I would like to congratulate and welcome Mr. Castillo to a borrowed seat on the Weslaco school board. I strongly believe you will be an asset to the students and staff of this district and have a lot to bring to the table. I trust you will have the best interests of this District at the forefront of every decision you make. Also, congratulations to our board president, Mrs. Sustaita. Thank you for all that you do and I know you will do an outstanding job as our School Board President. I would like to comment on agenda item XI-D: Discussion for Board to consider approval to purchase a software system for financial management and student information. First of all, if it's not broke - don't fix it. It is my understanding that it is over \$800,000.00 dollars. It was a one-person decision to want to purchase

this software. It is also my understanding that not one employee that works closely with this program is on board with this purchase. Trustees, something is very wrong with this picture. Who's the vendor, I wonder. In addition, there's a huge demand for more LPCs. Our LPCs, this year is their last year. Have you all considered budgeting to extend their contract for next year and add to continue providing mental health services to our amazing students? \$800,000 dollar could fund at least ten LPC's for next year. In working closely with students with chronic absences, many students are suffering from anxiety and depression. Let's put a stop to wasteful spending and funnel the money to continue to provide services for our students. Another example of wasteful spending is a flyer we all received today wanting to pay staff \$250.00 to submit retirement paperwork to HR before the 14 of February. Where did this come from? What is the logic behind it? Again, another prime example of wasteful spending. Another concern is the monthly payroll calendar and it being changed to the 25th. We have been getting paid on or before the 15th for decades. While changing this will benefit the district financially, it is affecting the livelihood, once again, of many staff that live paycheck to paycheck and are faced with having to make double mortgage payments which many cannot afford and will be facing late fees, etc. Let's have compassion and consider giving the staff this year time to plan for this change and perhaps implement this next school year. Agenda Item XII-4: Please do the right thing. There's a lot of talk about an employee who was suspended and brought back after election. There's an abuse of power. Staff without political ties have been terminated while those with ties get away time and time. To all of you sitting on those borrowed seats - do the right thing. Thank you for all that you do and God bless Weslaco ISD."

Dr. Coronado thanked Mr. Andres Sanchez for his 32 years of service to Weslaco ISD. Mr. Sanchez will retire at the end of December 2022.







U-2. Consultant Services for Strategic Planning (Proposal #23-12-28)

Mr. Ben Castillo pointed out that the proposal from Engage Learning, LLC was about \$20,000.00 more than the second ranked company. He wanted to know why the administration recommended this company.

9. Business Office – Local Fund to Set up a Budget for the Attendance Task Force which will be an Outreach Program to Support the Campus Efforts in Re-Engaging Families and Students with Poor Attendance and Disciplinary Issues to Achieve Career and Academic Success: \$341,476.00

- Mr. Castillo addressed the following questions/concerns:
- >What is the amount in the fund balance?
- •\$57 million
- >What is the recommended amount of money the district should have for operating expenses?
- •A district should have a total of 3 months cash on hand.
- •WISD has \$45 million in the fund balance (\$15 million per month).
- >Lack of funding for 1300 students: \$11.7 million estimated shortfall for ADA difference
- >Is the shortfall coming from the general fund balance?

According to Mr. David Robledo, Executive Director for Business & Finance, districts are using ESSER II & III to cover salaries for teachers in 3rd to 5th grade. Even though the district is building up the fund balance, staff will need to start having discussions on what to do when ESSER funding is finished.

Mr. Castillo thought it would be wise to wait on this initiative until they begin the budget process. Dr. Coronado pointed out that the district was in a great financial position. Therefore, he recommended approval of the task force in order to allow the specialists' time to recapture attendance early, rather than wait and lose money down the road.

After further discussion on the duties of the attendance task force, Mr. Isidoro Nieto made the motion to approve the budget amendment as presented. Armando Cuellar seconded the motion. Voting in favor of the motion were Armando Cuellar, Jesse Trevino, Isidoro Nieto, and Marcos De Los Santos. Ben Castillo voted against the motion. Motion carried with a 4 to 1 vote.

X. Discussion Items:

A. First Reading of Revisions to Policy FDA (Local): Admissions Interdistrict Transfers

The Board reviewed the first reading of Policy FDA (Local) which outlines intradistrict transfers.

- >The proposed amendment under section "Factors" includes an update to read, "In approving transfers, the Superintendent or designee shall consider availability of space and instructional staff and the student's disciplinary history, academic records, and attendance records. The District shall follow applicable state and federal law when considering the transfer request of a student with a known disability, including a student who receives special education services. The Superintendent shall also consider if false information was used to obtain a transfer."
- >The proposed amendment under section "Transfer Agreements" includes an update to read, "Violation of the terms of the agreement may result in a transfer request not being approved the following year or immediate removal within the approved school year."

No action was required for the first reading.

B. Presentation of 2022 Anticipated Collection Rate of Property Taxes for Fiscal Year 2022-2023

The Board of Trustees reviewed the 2022 anticipated collection rate of property taxes for fiscal year 2021-2022 as submitted by the Hidalgo County Tax Assessor/Collector.

Section 26.04 Property Tax Code, requires the Hidalgo County Tax Assessor/Collector to certify to the governing body of the taxing unit the anticipated collections in calculating the debt component of its Rollback Tax Rate for the current year by August 1st, or as soon thereafter as practicable. Hidalgo County certifies that the 2022 anticipated collection rate for Weslaco ISD for the fiscal year 2022-2023 has been projected at a 100% rate. The 2021-2022 estimated tax collection rate was projected

at 100% and consequently, no excess Debt Tax Collections are to be reported in Schedule B of the 2022 Debt Service Report.

C. Discussion Regarding School-Community Partnership Initiative 'Handle with Care' Between Local Law Enforcement and the School District for Students Impacted by Trauma and Violence

Chief Jose Rivera presented the following information pertaining to this partnership:

- •This program will help support children exposed to crime and abuse.
- •Sexual assault crimes are not shared with the district because this type of offense is prohibited from disclosure by law.
- •The goal is to notify the district within 24 hours when a student has experienced some form of trauma or violence.
- •The school will receive a phone call or email by the time the student arrives at school the following morning. This will allow staff to start providing services to the student as soon as possible.
- •Police officers will receive training on the process.
- •The kick-off date for this program is January 4, 2023.

As per Dr. Cynthia Cid, staff will contact the student within five days and the student will have the opportunity to receive counseling services from a licensed professional counselor, if necessary. LPC's, counselors, social workers, and principals have received training on the 'Handle with Care' initiative.

The board members felt this was a great initiative and thanked Chief Rivera for their partnership with the school district.

D. Discussion Regarding School-Community Partnership Initiative 'Crime Stoppers Organization' Between the Organization and the School District to Engage in Ongoing Efforts to Detect and Prevent Crime

Chief Joel Rivera provided the following information pertaining to this partnership:

- •Crime Stoppers is an organization that supports the Weslaco Police Department with their own Board.
- •Crime Stoppers will conduct investigations on any and all communications, reports, or tips regarding unsolved crimes.
- •This program will allow students and staff to report anonymous tips through a particular app that will be provided to the students. They are able to send in media, pictures, and video through this app and are able to communicate anonymously with the police department.
- •The Police Department has solved many crimes through this program based on the tips received.

Board President Jaclyn Sustaita addressed concerns from parents regarding accidents, crimes, etc. that occur afterschool, especially with students who walk home.

Chief Rivera informed the Board that Weslaco PD is working on the following as part of the initiative with the City of Weslaco:

- •A new crosswalk has been installed at Central Middle School.
- •Weslaco PD has passed several ordinances which designate certain areas as no parking zones because they obstruct the view of oncoming traffic. This will prevent accidents from occurring.
- •Weslaco PD will rotate traffic enforcement officers among several campuses.

Trustee Ben Castillo suggested designating the streets as 'one-way' during a certain time of the day, as well as hiring crossing guards at the elementary level to assist the children.

- E. Update on Training, Conferences, Events, and Consider Future Agenda Item Requests by Board Members
 - Dr. Coronado provided the following information:
 - •Administration proposed a workshop/special meeting for January 10, 2023 to address the Board selection of engineering services to fulfill district projects.
 - •Set up BoardBook training to include voting process
 - •Schedule a date for the team of eight training

Board President Sustaita wanted to know the status on the repairs of potholes at the different campuses.

•As per Mr. Americo Garza, the district will be working on repairing some of the potholes during the Christmas break. He will follow up with the City on the status of this initiative.

 - Dr. Coronado reviewed the stipend recommendation for part-time employees for a maximum of \$1,000.00 for the school year or a maximum of \$500.00 per semester:
 - >\$165.00 for part-time employees who work 1-22 days per semester
 - >\$335.00 for part-time employees who work 23-44 days per semester
 - >\$500.00 for part-time employees who work 45+ days per semester

Eligibility for the first payment will be determined by employees working part-time on or before September 30, 2022 through November 30, 2022. The first payment will be paid on December 19, 2022. Eligibility for the second payment will be determined by employees working part-time on or before January 31, 2023 and through May 26, 2023. The second payment will be paid in June 2023.
