Dr. R. E. Margo Elementary is located 5 miles north of the Mexican Boarder. Currently Margo has a population of 1002 students of which 97% are Hispanic and 3% are white. Of those students 55% are Economically Disadvantaged and 53% are At-Risk. Other demograpic information inculdes 25% Limited English Profecient, 9% Special Education, 4% Gifted and Talented and 4% Migrant.
